Dear Members, Friends, and Guests of Desert Hills Lutheran Church,

Now something from my class (taught by Dr. N.T. Wright) on Philippians. In Philippians 1:12-26 Paul is trying to encourage the little church in Philippi not to give up hope even though Paul is now in prison. In this last episode Dr. Wright said he believes Paul was imprisoned in Ephesus. Paul tells them that his being in prison will actually advance the gospel. The more that people can hear the gospel even if (verse 17) delivered by people preaching out of selfish ambition, not sincerely and to cause trouble, Paul doesn't care as long as King Jesus is proclaimed.

Then Paul talks about the elephant in the room, the possibility of being executed in prison. In verse 21: "For to me, to live is Christ and to die is gain." It so reminds me of our friend Dean Libner who, before a risky surgery, said: "Don't worry Pastor, in a week or so I'll either be golfing at Haven or I'll be with the Lord in heaven, either Haven or heaven." Paul is pretty sure he will remain and so he does for a few more years.

This all makes my sorting through boxes and going to the laundromat sound silly, but life is filled with both the silly and the serious; we will just face both by grace through faith in Jesus. Have a great Sunday.
